

Juri Morioka, an American-trained Japanese biomorphic abstractionist, is also new to this area. Her brightly painted, horizontal forms move and dissolve into each other like reflections on the surface of disturbed water. Light appears to settle on these translucent forms that float and drift toward viewers.

Another artist new to this area is Jamie Barron, who divides her time between New York and Sarasota. Her large acrylic, oil, ink and tape-on-paper "Protective Raven" suggests the mummification of a memory.

Her thick layers of clear tape, cut-out shapes and paint form enigmatic spaces inhabited by icons with historical associations. The paintings are both seductive in color and implicitly spiritual in intent.

Other notable works in this exhibit are a monotype woodcut, "Deep Water," by Jackie Battenfield; "Marigold Grid," a heavily textured, oil-on-canvas, minimalist abstraction by Cora Roth; seed-pod paintings by Cuban Luisa Basnuevo, and gouache and collage landscapes by

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
